WHO ARE THE PARTNERS?

The **host partner** can be an employer, house of worship, association, library, city government, or other organization. They often provide the space which can be empty office or warehouse space, classrooms in a House of Worship building, a community center, or other available space. They may also provide other resources from their available assets that might include nonteaching staffing, technology, etc.

The **technical partner** provides the education expertise. They design the educational plan and oversee the day-to-day teaching and learning. They are responsible for tracking growth, communicating with families, and managing any teaching and learning staff.

ROADMAP TO STARTING

DETERMINE THE NEEDS OF YOUR COMMUNITY

This stage is about understanding who and what matters most to your organization and the community you serve. It's a chance to reflect on the families you want to reach, the values and principles that guide your work, and the role learning can play in advancing your broader mission.

This step also invites thoughtful consideration of how a microschool can best serve your community, including the ages and stages of learners where impact would be most meaningful. When these elements are clear from the start, the microschool is better positioned to align with real needs, build trust, and grow with intention.

CONNECT WITH THE CENTER

This is where ideas start to take shape. Reaching out to the National Microschooling Center opens the door to a real conversation about your goals, your community, and what's already in place. We'll talk through your needs, assess your current situation, and help clarify next steps. If a technical partner isn't identified yet, we can help make the right connection. From there, we move forward together, turning possibility into a clear path toward launch.

UNDERSTANDING REQUIREMENTS

Essential first steps include understanding your state's rules and requirements for nontraditional schooling options to make sure what you are building will comply. We can help you review what you need to know so you can make informed decisions that are right for you.

CREATE THE FRAMEWORK

With the right partners at the table, the work becomes concrete. This phase brings host partners, technical partners, and the National Microschooling Center together to build the framework that will guide the microschool day to day. That includes developing the learning plan, outlining a realistic budget, and establishing clear policies and procedures through tools like a family and staff handbook. By building these elements collaboratively, partners create shared understanding, clear expectations, and a strong operational foundation that supports both learning and long-term sustainability.

TRAININGS, OPERATION, ITERATION AND CONTINUE SUPPORT

Launching a partnership microschool is not the finish line, it's the beginning. The National Microschooling Center offers trainings for both host and technical partners, ensuring everyone understands their role and has the tools to succeed. LEARNING TOOLS

The National Microschooling Center secures district-only, bulk-requirement learning tools to provide access to small microschools.

Microschooling offers extraordinary flexibility, and with that comes a wide range of possible learning tools and curricula.

One of the defining strengths of microschooling is the ability to design learning around individual students, meeting them where they are academically and developmentally. With that in mind, these are some of the tools we often recommend and are happy to help integrate into your program. We work closely with technical partners to assess fit, explore options, and thoughtfully incorporate the resources that best support your learners, alongside any additional tools you may already be considering.



FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1 DOES MY STAFF NEED TEACHING EXPERIENCE?

No! The host partner staff does not need any teaching experience. The technical partner will often have teaching experience, though they may not need to have a current teaching license. We will work with both partners to ensure microschools are operating in the required frameworks and at a level that works for everyone's comfort.

2 WHAT SPACE WORKS FOR A MICROSCHOOL?

We have worked to build partnership microschools in a variety of locations. Keep in mind the number of children you will be serving when you think of a space that works for you. Libraries, recreation centers, empty office space, and conference rooms can all be feasible options.

3 DO MICROSCHOOLS NEED TO STICK TO THEIR STATE'S ACADEMIC CONTENT STANDARDS?

Every state has different rules and requirements for nonpublic schools and homeschooling cooperatives. Depending on how you choose to operate (homeschool laws or nonpublic school) will determine if you need to align to specific content standards. Family comfort level, and access to learning tools, might factor into your decision as well.

4 HOW MUCH DOES IT COST?

Depending on the format and services provided by you to your learners, the cost will vary. An important factor to consider is any potential school choice funding in your state. If you already have the facilities and technology, the main cost will be your teaching staff. You can determine if this is a cost you can cover, or if you need to pass this cost on to your families by charging a fee to attend. This is something that can be worked out together with the host partner and technical partner when developing a budget.

5 HOW DOES A PARTNERSHIP MICROSCHOOL BENEFIT THE HOST PARTNER?

A partnership microschool allows host partners to offer a real, tangible solution to a need in their community. For employers, it can increase employee satisfaction and productivity, reduce turnover, and strengthen recruitment by supporting working families in meaningful ways. For municipalities, it creates a flexible tool to better serve residents and respond to local education gaps. High school partnership microschools can also support workforce development by aligning learning with real career pathways.

For values- or principle-driven organizations, aligned partnership microschooling extends those principles into daily practice, deepening community impact and advancing mission fulfillment. In every case, the benefit is the same: a purpose-built educational option that strengthens relationships, supports families, and helps the host partner live out its mission in a lasting way.
