WHAT IS CATHOLIC MICROSCHOOLING?

All Catholic schools, including microschools, must, according to Canon Law, hold the consent of their diocesan Bishop, who maintains the right to watch over and inspect their operations.

Catholic microschooling can be a form of **partnership microschooling**. In partnership microschooling there is a host partner and a technical partner.

Catholic churches can act as a **host partner**. If a Catholic church has available classroom space, they may make space available for microschools to utilize during the week. If a church has other resources available to share, such as staffing to support nonteaching functions, technology, or recreational space, these can be valuable assets for a microschool.

They may also choose to work with a **technical partner**, who designs the educational plan and oversees the day-to-day teaching and learning. They can be responsible for tracking academic growth, managing communicating with families, and other important functions. While faith can be incorporated into all subjects, Catholic education may be shared with church leadership and families.

Catholic microschools can also be **independent microschools**, operating as an individual or organization solely responsible for creating the microschool.

There are also Catholic **provider network microschools** that can work with individuals to launch Catholic microschools under their umbrella.

WHY CATHOLIC MICROSCHOOLING?

Microschooling's versatile small learning environments and flexibilities offer an approach particularly well suited to today's Catholic education.

In communities where traditional Catholic school models are less viable or prohibitively costly, Catholic microschooling offers operational advantages.

We also believe that there are a variety of benefits available that can be tailored to each unique situation. In the case of Catholic microschooling, the value added to your community can be immense, everything from a quality education to the children in your congregation to a way for other members to share their talents and give back.

Microschooling supports the "wide range of life experiences and learning processes," that Pope Francis describes as vital to offer young people. "They need to be taken out of the classroom, their minds need to be taken out of the classroom, their hearts need to be taken out of the classroom," he explained as he described the Church's educational mission in an address to educators in 2015.

Today's microschooling models can support each of these to occur with frequency and depth.

PRIVATE SCHOOL OR HOMESCHOOL MODEL?

Microschools often enjoy success either as learning centers supporting families following their state's homeschooling requirements or as private schools. We can help you determine if school choice funds are available in your state and how your microschool might be eligible.

The National Microschooling Center can help you understand your state's frameworks, look at the different paths forward, and navigate these choices alongside your organization.

A homeschool schedule allows flexibility to build around other family needs, so that supporting their children's education can be fully compatible with schedules and requirements families do not control. Travel or other real-world learning opportunities, parents' work obligations, even weather can be met absent the necessary rigidities of running large organizations.

In certain states, the policy framework governing religious-exempt private schools makes microschooling under that private school laws appealing, especially in states with school choice programs. Organizing your microschool as a private school can often help increase parent comfort level and confidence.

Canon Law instructs, "There must be the closest cooperation between parents and teachers.... In fulfilling their task, teachers are to collaborate closely with the parents...."

Microschools, regardless of governance models, are built on relationships and consist of active partnerships between educators and families.

Whether it is a learning center serving homeschooled children or a licensed private school, many families choose microschools because of the collaboration that occurs between educators and parents.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1 DOES MY STAFF NEED TEACHING EXPERIENCE?

They do not need to be licensed teachers, or have teaching experience, in order to teach at or lead a microschool, but it can help. Your microschooling team can be created utilizing current staff that we can train, as well as adding additional staff members. If you are looking for individuals with teaching experience, we can help you find the right people.

2 WHAT SPACE WORKS FOR A MICROSCHOOL?

You are not limited to traditional classroom space. A church with empty rooms during the week can be an ideal facility space. Consider what materials will be needed for the microschool day. Will these materials need to be removed at the end of each day? Perhaps the end of each week? Can there be a clear delineation of space?

3 DO MICROSCHOOLS NEED TO STICK TO THEIR STATE'S ACADEMIC CONTENT STANDARDS?

Academic content standards are approved by each state for their public schools. If microschools are serving homeschool children, their curricular choices are up to them, and can be chosen to best meet the needs of the particular learners served. In some states, homeschool families are required to ensure certain subjects are taught, along with adhering to certain requirements for assessing children.

4 HOW MUCH DOES IT COST?

Depending on the format and services provided by you to your learners, the cost will vary. If you already have the facilities and technology, the main cost will be your teaching staff. You can determine if this is a cost you can cover, or if you need to pass this cost on to your families by charging a fee to attend.
